

### A.I. Audio Books

I recently received an interesting email from Amazon KDP (Kindle Direct Publishing) to convert one of my existing Ebooks within their "bookshelf" into an audio book using A.I. generated voice narration. I was intrigued. Reading more about the process, I decided to experiment.

My first Meadowood Mystery was a book called "Scarecrows and Corpses" - I know, another ghoulish title - and it was self-published in KDP. So I decided to use this title to convert into an audio book.

What did I have to lose? Following the Amazon process, it was easy to instantly load the Ebook format on file into this audio setting. Now the fun part ... I got to audition twenty different A.I. voices to select one that I felt sounded appropriate for this tale. The category ranged from female age 30-40 using American English, to male of the same range, to female or male British English and even a choice of male or female Southern American English and with different age ranges.

Some voices were low and more baritone, others a tenor, the female voice more girlish or mature matron. I finally settled on the female, American English voice of a 30-40 age range. After all, the story is told in first person through the eyes of Meredith Gardner, a 30 something wife and mother.

I found that the difficult part of this process came next. Listening Chapter by chapter, line by line, word by word, I sat and listened to the A.I. generated voice read my story. I had to stop it and start again continuously after inserting pauses where I wanted the narration to pause for effect, like a real human would when reading. There were words that the computer mispronounced and I was given the option to stop and correct the pronunciation by inserting a phonetic word to assist the computer. I found it trying at best to try to indicate where a long "a" would be spoken versus a soft "a", for instance. The A.I. struggled over the word Avon (the cosmetics that Meredith sold). We all know that word begins with a long "A" sound, but the computer just didn't quite get it.

The audio edit process took longer than I had expected. It was interesting and at times satisfying to hear my story being spoken, yet frustrating too when I couldn't resolve a pronunciation issue or make the pause after a particular word or phrase show more emphasis and not merely a blip on the recording.

Overall, the A.I. narrated audio book was a learning experience, cost free, and worth trying, I think. Time will tell. No doubt about it, if you invested the money to hire a real voice actor, the results would be far

more superior and satisfying for an author. But hey, with no investment in this process other than my time, I figured, why not?
